The Rev. Peter J. Gomes, the pastor of Memorial Church in Boston has an Easter sermon in his book, Sermons: Biblical Wisdom for Daily Living. In it he talks about the resurrection being God's way of getting our attention. It is God's way of making us listen up, God's way of getting us to look, to listen, and to live. The first thing to remember, once God gets our attention, is that there is nothing subtle about Easter, nothing vague or ambiguous or vain or clever or cute about it at all. To make that point, God does not begin Easter Day as the slow, gradual triumph of the dawn over the darkness; rather he takes a leaf from the notebook of Cecil B. DeMille himself, and God begins Easter with an earthquake (Matthew 28:2).

God knows how to get our attention. God knows how to begin a new relationship. Easter is not a morning for artful arguments, subtle distinctions, the stuff of seminars. Not a bit; it does not creep up on us on little cat feet like the fog. Easter is confrontational; you're hit in the face by it. It is God's intention to get our attention, and God does.

Because Jesus lives we too may live, with as much time as God gives us, free from fear of the past, free from fear of the future. Christ ever goes before us. "He goes before you," says Saint Matthew. Jesus goes before us blazing a path for us to follow, and where Christ has gone we need not fear. Christ went to the cross; we need not fear the cross. Christ went to the grave; we need not fear the grave. Christ has gone into the future; we need not fear the future. Christ inhabits life; we need not fear life. God gets our attention; God tells us that God has come in Jesus Christ that we may have life and that we may have it more abundantly. Because Christ lives, so, too, may we. Life begins when we discover this truth for ourselves and act upon it.

Christ is Risen! Christ is Risen Indeed! Alleluia!

The **Celebration of the Resurrection / Easter Sunday**, April 4th at 9:00 and 11:00 a.m. On this glorious day we rejoice for God has indeed raised Jesus from the dead! Invite your neighbors, friends and relatives to come, celebrate and be glad!

The **Second Sunday of Easter**, April 11th. The season of Easter is a celebration that last for seven weeks. On this day we hear the familiar story of Jesus' appearance to the fearful disciples in the upper room, and of Jesus' appearance to a disbelieving Thomas.

On this **Third Sunday in the season of Easter**, April 18th, we encounter the resurrected Jesus visiting the disciples by the sea and having breakfast with them.

Sunday April 25th, (**4th Sunday in Easter**), we move back a bit into Jesus' life before his death and resurrection. In our gospel story we hear Jesus talking about his relationship with God.

Adult Education on Sunday Mornings in April

On Easter Sunday we invite everyone to enjoy a brunch between the services when Sunday School usually happens. Christ is Risen! Christ is Risen Indeed! Alleluia! Our regular Sunday morning adult education ministry then continues on the 11th with our Constitution Task Force. This is their final class until one in May. Who is LWR?

Lutheran World Relief, an international nonprofit organization, works to end poverty and injustice by empowering some of the world's most impoverished communities to help themselves. It is a ministry of the ELCA and The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod and has on site partners for international relief, development, advocacy and social responsibility in 35 countries.

Haiti-Background

Haiti, which in 1804 became the first country in Latin America to achieve independence, has struggled in the subsequent two hundred years to provide peace, security and prosperity for its people. The country's political history has been characterized by multiple coups, dictatorships, and corrupt and inefficient governments.

Economically, the country ranks as the poorest in the Western hemisphere, and among the poorest in the world. Most Haitians survive from subsistence farming or fishing and the country's only principal export is mangoes. Infrastructure is severely degraded, with frequent power outages, lack of water and sewage services, and very few paved roads. Exacerbating the fragile economic situation is Haiti's high vulnerability to natural disasters like hurricanes and earthquakes (a major fault line runs right through Port-au-Prince). Centuries of indiscriminate deforestation and slash-and-burn agriculture have left its steep hillsides barren and vulnerable to slides and flooding and destruction of property, homes, and lives.

LWR history in Haiti

LWR began supporting projects in Haiti in 1997. Guiding their efforts is the strong belief that working with local partners is critical to lasting changes. From the start, their work has been implemented by local partner World Neighbors which focuses on building the capacity of peasant organizations to promote healthier lives and improved livelihoods in rural communities. Also, they are involved in recovery efforts from disasters, such as the aftermath of hurricanes Fay, Gustav, Hanna and Ike in 2008.

Specific foci are:

- Increased food production for consumption and marketing, teaching improved farming techniques, soil and water conservation, food storage
- Reduction in maternal and child mortality-training, health care, preventative care, improved diet, parent education
- Improvement in supply of potable water
- Income generation through support of women's and farmer's savings and credit systems

LWR – Earthquake Relief 2010

In partnership and coordination with fellow members of the Action by Churches Together (ACT), LWR continues working to bring water, food, sanitation, shelter, health kits, layettes and other essential aid to survivors. LWR is working in four cities outside of Port-au-Prince to bring these items and services to more than 19,000 people. With another partner, Christian Aid, they are distributing food to families in the area of Deima, one of the most heavily affected areas of the capital.

LWR has pledged a long-term commitment in Haiti of at least 3-5 years focusing mainly on underserved rural areas outside Port-au-Prince. Even those places that did not sustain damage will be strained by the anticipated migration of hundreds of thousands of people leaving the capital. The northern department of Artibonite, where LWR has worked for 14 years is seeing the largest influx of migrants, putting a significant strain on already limited resources and infrastructure.

“The road to recovery for the people of Haiti will be a long one and the work is just beginning” says LWR president John Nunes. “LWR is committed to seeing this work through and helping the people of Haiti grow stronger and more self-sufficient.”

MLC & LWR

Our congregation responds generously when there is great need. Following the earthquake in Haiti individuals contributed to LWR for Haiti relief through Marin Lutheran as well as directly to LWR. Our youth chose LWR, specifically Haiti relief to be the recipient of the *Souper Bowl of Caring* collection and sent \$932 to them.

LWR has now extended a special plea for **Health Kits** and have arranged for an emergency response ingathering (a day when collections are received at an area church, and then transported to the LWR warehouses back east) for Northern California. Marin Lutheran will be taking health kits to Advent Lutheran in Morgan Hill on April 24th. We are asking for help from everyone in collecting these kits. The directions for assembling these kits are below. You can put completed kits in the blue bin in the narthex. Final Sunday collection day – April 18th.

Health Kits

Directions for health kits need to be followed exactly please.

Items to include in each kit:

- One hand towel, dark color recommended
- One washcloth, dark color recommended
- One bath-size (4-5oz.) bar of soap, any brand, in its original wrapping
- One adult-size toothbrush in its original packaging
- One sturdy comb, remove packaging
- One metal nail file, or nail clippers with file attached, remove packaging (do not substitute cardboard emery boards for the file)
- Six Band-Aids (any brand), preferably 1/2 – 3/4” – secure together with a rubber band.



All items should be new. Do not add other items or leave out any of the items. **No toothpaste** (this is added at the warehouse).

Packaging: Wrap smaller items in the washcloth – wrap washcloth and remaining items in the towel and tie securely with ribbon or yarn. Do not enclose kit or any of its contents in plastic bags.

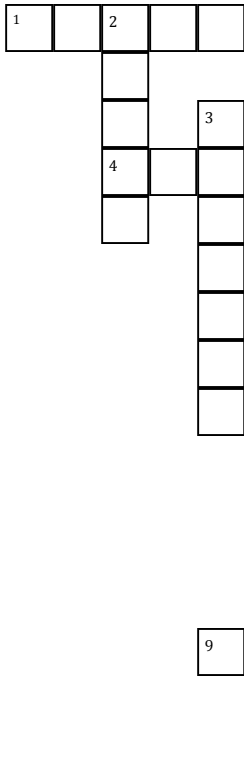
Food Barrel

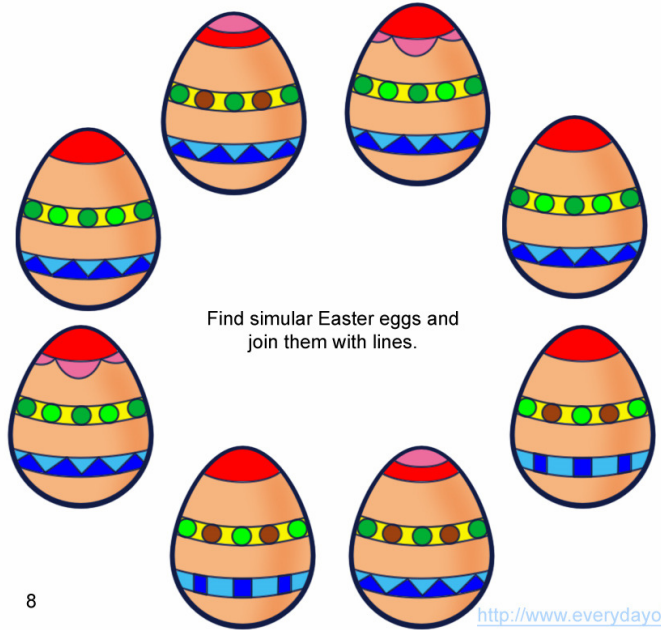
